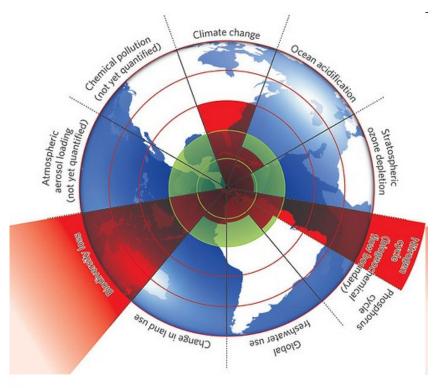

Pandemic

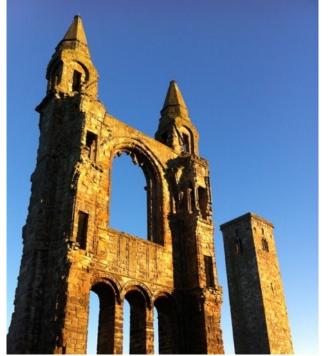
3.4 million Black Americans would be alive today if their life expectancy was the same as White people's. Before COVID-19, that alarming number was already 2.1 million.

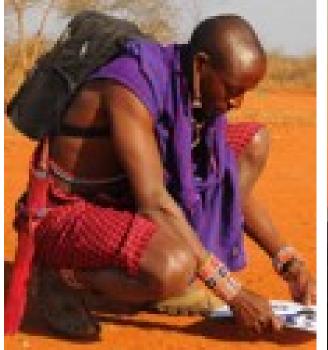

Behaviours Values Attitudes

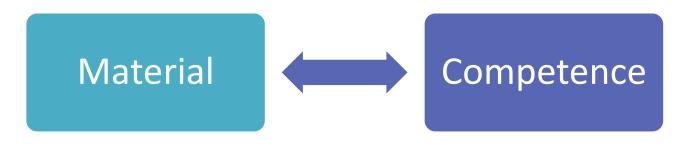
Movement for change: societal norms and practices

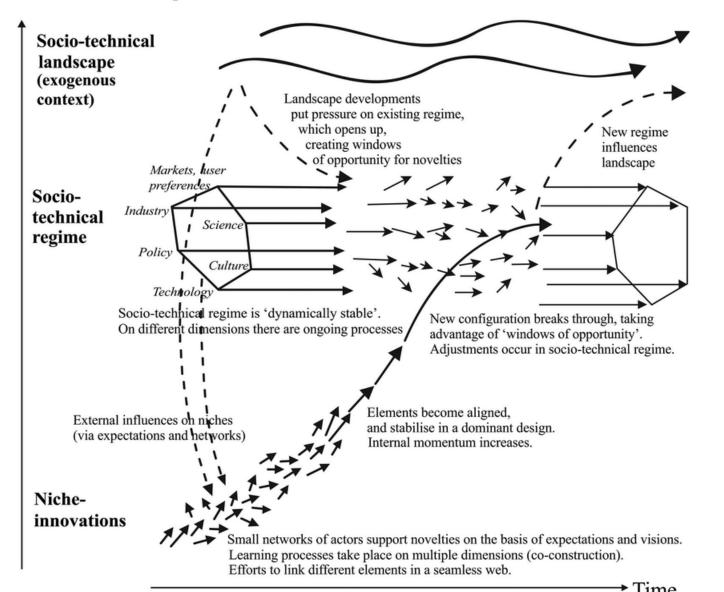

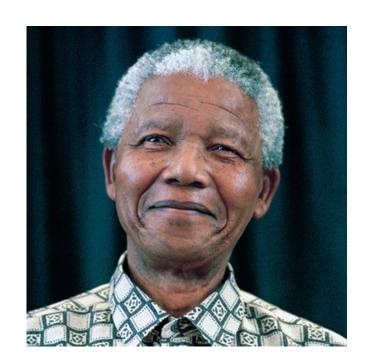
Increasing structuration of activities in local practices

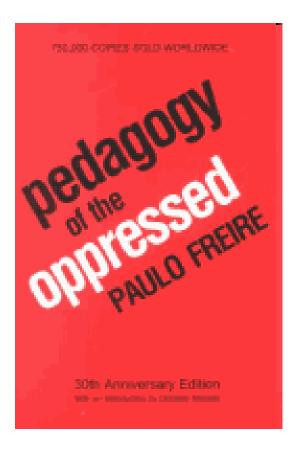
